Paul L. Gareau is an assistant professor at the Faculty of Native Studies and is a Research Fellow for the Rupertsland Centre for Métis Research at the University of Alberta. He holds a Bachelors of Religious Studies and Anthropology in 2006 as well as a Master's Degree in History and Philosophy of Religion in 2009 both from Concordia University in Montreal. He has received a Doctorate in Religious Studies in 2016 from the University of Ottawa under Dr. Lori Beaman looking at the identity politics of Catholic evangelical youth with a thesis entitled, "Journeying to the Father: Researching Faith and Identity in a Contemporary Catholic Youth Movement in Canada." He was a student team member of the Religion and Diversity Project.

His research is grounded in critical theory and methodology relating to the social and cultural impacts of religion on identity formation. His academic publications and community research projects explore the influence of Catholicism on early and late modern identity, the legacy of colonial discourses on Indigenous and ethno-cultural minorities, and the multiplicity of experience in rural spaces. His research focuses on the Métis and religion, Indigenous lifeways, youth, gender, *la francophonie*, and rural Canada.
