- 6. What methods did the author use to analyze the data?
- 7. What were four themes that the author found in analyzing the data?
- 8. What is one implication of this study for the sociology of religion?
- 9. What is one thing that you learned from this article that you did not know before?

Quantitative Research

Read the article and answer the following questions. Please note that you are not expected to understand OLS or logistic regression. I will explain Table 1 and 2. If you do not understand other stats, assume that what the author says about the stats is correct.

- 1. What are the (key) independent variables (there are two, or you could say one is an intervening variable)? What is the dependent variable?
- 2. What is the predicted relationship (or hypotheses) between the independent and dependent variable?
- 3. In a sentence or two, describe the sample. What does "probability sample" mean?
- 4. What is the theory? In other words, why does the author think the independent variables have a causal influence on the dependent variable? (Hint: it has something to do with "embeddedness in a religio-cultural community").
- 5. How did the author measure the (key) independent variables and the dependent variable (hint: they are measured by one question each)?
- 6. Were the (four) hypotheses supported?
- 7. The author admits to limitations in this study in conclusion/discussion section. What are they?
